Paralyzed or not, Bill Blomgren still enjoys popping a good wheelie.

Paralyzed in '66, Riding in '71

here's a pretty common bar he was paralyzed for life from the story that a biker hears a lot: "Yeah, I used to ride, but I crashed and broke my leg. And I never wanted to ride again. . . ."

Bill Blomgren, owner and operator of B & B Cycle in Tujunga, takes the story at least one better.

In '66, Blomgren was a hard-chargin' dirt biker, carrying No. 26 plates in his district.

He high-sided it one day, racing in Simi Valley, and broke his back. After six months in the hospital, Blomgren was back together-except that waist down.

The first thing he did when he finally got out of the hospital was to repair the bike he crashed on and put it out for sale.


And \$625 dollars later, he had the capital to start his own business, a bike repair shop.

The second thing he did proved that Blomgren, paralyzed or not, is a stone biker.

He planned for a year, and then sent word to a buddy of his in Colorado, Gaylon Reynolds, to come

own and help him build a bike.

Six months later, Blomgren started utting again—this time as a hardharging Vair-powered trike rider,

THE FRAME FOR the three-wheeler as built from the ground up by slomgren, using the front end from '67 Harley Glide.

A '62 Corvair engine was rebuilt ompletely to the stock specification f 85 horses. The engine puts it on ne ground through a two-speed Powrglide automatic transmission, with hift control mounted through the intrument panel.

The drive rotation is reversed hrough a set of remachined VW Mirobus reduction boxes, and pushes set of Ansen wheels, with 17-inch vide Firestones for skins. A 3.00 x 1 Avon, mounted on a spool hub, erves as front rubber.

For stopping, Blomgren hooked up set of VW brakes to a Ford vacum-boosted master cylinder. The reult is power brakes, with the controls in the handlebars.

Blomgren also built the triple trees

and the front fork tubes.

The gas tank was mounted under the handmade body, and the old tank area was used to house the woodpaneled coffin-styled instrument panel, with a speedo, oil pressure gauge, ammeter and gas gauge.

Blomgren uses the bike as a multi-

purpose machine. Not only is it good for jammin' around town but, with the sides painted, serves as a rolling advertisement.

Even more, the trike is rolling proof that Blomgren won't quit, no matter what. Paralyzed or not, he still remains a biker's biker.
